Monday Nights in Fall 2016

Monday nights in September will be limited to completing the C1 class. Beginning in **October 3**, Monday nights will resume an alternating schedule of A2 and C1 dancing from 7:30pm to 9:30pm. We're hoping to reinvigorate the A2 dancing community to come back out on Monday nights for good calling and fundancing.

Thursday Nights in Fall 2016

Thursday nights this fall will focus primarily on Mainstream dancing. The Education Committee wants to ensure that all MS Blast grads have ample opportunity to grow their Mainstream dancing skills. A Plus tip will be called at the end of each night. Therron Ricks will be calling MS review from 7-7:30pm! Dancing ends at 9:30pm.

Upcoming Events

The Education Committee has been developing a rigorous schedule of events through 2017. The focus is to develop and reinforce dance skills for MS and Plus dancers. There will be both Spring and Fall 2017 Blasts. The Committee redesigned the Spring 2017 Blast to spread over two weekends in March, Saturdays and Sundays, 3/4-3/5 and 3/11-3/12. The goal is for more class time and more dance time to help solidify the learning process and increase comfort at social dances.

The Education Committee has also designed 4 Workshop and Dance events in 2017, 2 Mainstream and 2 Plus events. Each event consists of a 4-hour workshop, followed by a dinner break, then a 2-hour dance. These promise to be a lot of fun and a great way to work on our Mainstream and Plus skills. Pricing will be \$8 per session (\$16 for the day) and dinner 'on your own'. The dates for the MS Workshops are 1/21/17 and 6/3/17. The Plus workshops are on 2/18/17 and 10/21/17. These will help dancers solidify their kills and increase their comfort before the Grand Rapids fly-in and the convention in Palm Springs.

There are no plans for a Plus Series (event to learn Plus for the first time) or Advanced class in 2017. The Education Committee wants to ensure new dancers have the skills and comfort needed to successfully move along to the next dance level.



- All dancers attending Saturday night of Crossfire are encouraged to wear comfortable clothes that reflect FUN, SPLASHY/BRIGHT. Think red, orange and purple. These colors will show up well on video, and will help augment our generally low lighting in the grand dance hall. These colors will be as photogenic or reflect our unique spirit as an LGBTQ+ Club.
- Please avoid wearing solid white shirts as they tend not photograph as well. If you like white, add a vest...or boa!
- Please avoid Pastel Colors such as green, yellow and lavender; these colors have a soft, subdued shade in photos.

During this period of dancing we hope to have multiple singing calls with upbeat music to generate a natural feeling of lightheartedness and enthusiasm.

Update on Club Finances by John Wood

I am pleased to report that after a difficult 2013 and 2014, the turnaround in club finances that we saw in 2015 has continued into 2016. Year to date our overall income is covering our ongoing expenses; as such we are no longer spending into our cash reserves as we were in 2013 and 2014. Specific positive developments for 2016 are:

- Revenue from our Thursday night events which includes First Thursday as well as Mainstream/Plus workshops is up 32% for 2016 vs. 2015.
- 2015 Revenue from Club Dances is up 15% for 2016 vs. 2015.
- Crossfire 2015 turned a profit for the club, and if current trends continue 2016 will also be profitable.
- The expenses and revenue for First Thursday/Blast are essentially equal. This is a significant improvement from the historic approach where expenses of lessons were greater than revenue.

There are a few negative trends for 2016 vs. 2015

- 2016 Membership renewals are down 23% compared to the same time last year
- In 2014 and 2015 there was a donation from All Join Hands to assist with the cost of our Mainstream Blast, this has not continued for 2016
- Membership expense has increased in terms of advertising and overall dance expenses. However, the increased spending on these items may be partially responsible for the increased dance revenue that we are seeing.

The above is a result of the hard work of a great many people in our club, our club callers, Crossfire Committee as well as many new approaches from our Way Forward and Education Committees, and generous donations from our loyal members. The Board wants to thank everyone for their efforts.





Changes to Callerlab Dance Programs by Michael Maltenfort

Although we often think of the CALLERLAB dance pro- Advanced grams as fixed, they do change over time. You may find it Half Breed Thru helpful to know what has changed in recent years. (These changes are made by committees that don't publish their Split Square Chain Thru reasons, so don't ask for any!)

For definitions, most dancer uses Taminations, which also has animations, (http://www.tamtwirlers.org/tamination/ info/index.html) or the Ceder Chest definitions (www.ceder.net/def.php). The official definitions are avail-CALLERLAB able from the Web site www.callerlab.org/Dance-Programs, these have the advantage of listing what changes occurred when—they appear in a table at the beginning. Here are the recent changes:

Basic

Extend

Previously limited to start from a 1/4 Tag formation below Plus. Now allowed from all formations (especially Ocean Waves, but also Beginning Double Pass Thru, 3/4 Tag, Box Circulate, etc.) Note: although this change has occurred, the official definition does not yet reflect the change.

Mainstream

No changes

Plus

Extend

Removed from Plus list, because all uses of Extend are now on the Basic program

Follow Your Neighbor

Now permitted from a 1/4 Tag formation (from this formation, everyone Extend and Cast Off 3/4). E.g., Heads Pass the Ocean, all Follow Your Neighbor

Name changed to Brace Thru

Moved from A2 to A1

Triple Cross

Added to A1 (previously at C1)

Section on Left and Reverse revised (in preface of official CALLERLAB definitions)

> In particular, dancers are expected to know how to use Reverse with the following calls: Rollaway, Half Sashay, Wheel Around, Courtesy Turn, Flutter wheel, Dixie Style to a Wave, Circle To A Line, Single Circle to a Wave, Swap Around, Recycle (from Facing Couples). Note that use of these calls below Advanced is not prohibited.

Now allowed from a 1/4 Tag (definition: all Cross Extend and Cast Off 3/4)

IAGSDC Changes and an Article about Gender

The IAGSDC amended Articles I and II of their bylaws to embrace more gender inclusive language at the July 2016 convention in Toronto. These changes specifically includes transgender, queer, questioning, and intersex people, as you can see in their bylaws language below.

ARTICLE I- NAME

The name of this Association shall be the "INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF GAY SQUARE DANCE CLUBS, An LGBTQ* Organization." LGBTQ* = Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer, Questioning, Intersex and their friends.

ARTICLE II- PURPOSE

This Association is a non-profit organization of square dance clubs whose purposes are:

- A. To promote Modem Western Square Dancing.
- B. To enhance the image of LGBTQ* people, especially in the international square dance community.
- C. To provide an opportunity for the social and dancing interchange of individual members as well as to provide a forum for the exchange of ideas among the member clubs.
- D. To support and encourage the growth of its membership.

Sometimes names, pronouns, and assumptions about gender can trip up the best of us. I've included an article that I've come across recently that I hope helps us understand our own thinking and what we can do individually to be more inclusive. I wrote the author for permission to reprint it here in full. They gave us full permission to reprint it, and they admitted to me that they "LOVED" square dancing. Everything You Ever Wanted To Know About Gender Neutral Pronouns

By now, the cultural visibility of the transgender, genderqueer and gender nonconforming community has seriously expanded the way that we view gender. And while general awareness about gender diversity has increased, there are still some technical aspects that many people continue to struggle with, chief among those being the use of gender-neutral pronouns.

As a genderqueer advocate and media personality who has used gender-neutral pronouns for years, I have quite a few pointers and tips to share. But don't just take it from me; I also spoke with Nick Adams, director of GLAAD's transgender media program, about his thoughts on the issue. With our guidance, you can show up to that gender-fabulous dance party with confidence.

Let's get to it!

Why do people want to use gender-neutral pronouns anyway? What's wrong with gendered pronouns?

It's not that there is something *wrong* with gendered pronouns; it's just that the pronouns "he" and "she" come with a certain set of expectations about how someone should express their identity and relate to the world. For many people, gender normativity can get in the way of self-expression—so the words "he" or "she" can feel limiting. "Some people have a gender identity that is non-binary, and conventional pronouns have the effect of assigning them a binary identity," says Adams.

Take me, for example. I was assigned male at birth, but I've spent a good portion of my life trying to get away from the expectations that have been placed on me because of that. Asking people to use the gender-neutral pronoun "they" instead of "he" to refer to me has been a big step in my journey toward self-love and self-acceptance.

If someone doesn't want to be referred to as "he" or "she," what should I use? What are the options?

In my experience, the most common gender-neutral pronoun used by genderqueer and gender nonconforming people is "they/them/their," but that doesn't mean it's the only option. Some people choose to use the gender-neutral pronouns "ze/hir/hirs" (pronounced "zee/here/heres") or "ey/em/eir" (pronounced "ay/em/airs"), among others. There are lots of gender-neutral pronouns out there, and they can certainly get confusing. That's where Google comes in handy!

My fifth grade teacher always told me that using "they" as a singular pronoun was grammatically incorrect. Is my fifth grade teacher wrong about that?

While I'm sure your fifth grade teacher meant well when they were teaching you the rules about pronouns, the rules you learned in fifth grade are most likely outdated by now. In fact, the 200 linguists at the American Dialect Society declared the singular "they" the 2015 word of the year. Merriam-Webster and the Oxford dictionary both also include the singular "they."

Whether your fifth grade teacher likes it or not, "they" is now a recognized and *grammatically correct* singular pronoun.

Also, I don't know the gender identity of your fifth grade teacher, which is why I used "they," rather than "he or she." Not only is "they" a more streamlined option, "they" also allows room for the possibility that your fifth grade teacher didn't identify as a man or a woman at all!

Maybe they were genderqueer. Maybe they were nonbinary. I don't know their gender, so I'm not going to artificially limit your fifth grade teacher's gender identity to one of two options. It's a more inclusive, fabulous way to go about it.

So we can just make up any words we want now?

Kind of! Like gender, language is necessarily a creative enterprise that changes over time. The honorific "Ms." is a great example. "At some point in the past, 'Ms.' was a new honorific to recognize a woman who didn't want to be addressed solely on the basis of her marital status," says Adams. "Now, we don't even question its use."

Language changes; it grows, expands, morphs and adapts to meet the needs of the modern day. That's part of what makes it fun. The addition of gender-neutral pronouns in the English language is just another part of that evolution.

O.K., fine. I guess gender-neutral pronouns are grammatically correct. But how do I conjugate them?

It changes with each type of gender-neutral pronoun, but the conjugation for the singular "they" is fairly intuitive. Take me, for example. I use "they" as my pronoun, so you could talk about me like this:

Jacob went to the store to get some guacamole supplies. They were having a lovely time until they lost their temper when they couldn't find any ripe avocados. They shouldn't be too hard on themself, though. They'll probably have better luck on their guacamole quest next time.

What about Ms., Mrs. and Mr.? Are there gender-neutral options for those?

Fortunately, there are! If you need to refer to someone who prefers gender-neutral pronouns in a formal context, you can use the gender-neutral honorific "Mx." If you're inviting me to your fancy dinner party, you can address the invitation to "Mx. Tobia."

Are gender-neutral pronouns only for transgender and gender nonconforming people?

Not at all. While gender-neutral pronouns are often used by genderqueer and gender nonconforming people, you don't have to identify that way in order to use them. If you feel more comfortable navigating the world without gendered expectations, then gender-neutral pronouns can work for you. There's no identity you *have* to claim in order to use gender-less language. "Anyone who wants to use gender-neutral pronouns can use them," agrees Adams.

I saw someone who looked like they may have been genderqueer the other day. Should I have used genderneutral pronouns?

Perhaps, but that's not the right question to ask. You can never make any assumptions about what pronoun someone uses based off of their appearance. There's no such thing as "looking like" a he, a she or a they. The only way you can know what pronoun someone prefers is by *asking them*.

In practice, you should ask everyone what pronoun they use if you don't know. When you don't know someone's pronouns and can't ask them, it's always safe to use the genderneutral "they" until you hear otherwise.

Isn't that awkward to ask when you first meet someone?

Meeting new people is always awkward. But using the wrong pronoun to refer to someone is more awkward because pronouns are about respect. "By using the right pronoun, you can show that you see and respect their identity," says Adams. Really, it's about creating a culture where asking people about their pronouns is just a normal, natural part of introductions. Like this:

"Hello, new person that I'm meeting at a cocktail party. I'm Jacob."

"Nice to meet you. I'm Andre. What pronouns do you use Jacob?"

"I use they. What about you?"

"I use he, thanks for asking. Anyway, um, some weather we're having today, huh?"

Asking about pronouns will not solve your social awkwardness issues, but it will definitely make you a nicer, more empathetic human being.

Are you sure that I have to ask? Won't someone just tell me if they prefer a pronoun other than he or she?

Someone might proactively tell you if they prefer genderneutral pronouns, but if you make an assumption about their pronoun without asking, then the onus will fall on them to *correct you*. And we all know how awkward it is to have to correct an erroneous assumption that a stranger makes about you.

It'd be like living in New York City, assuming that *everyone* celebrates Christmas and then expecting people who celebrate another holiday to correct you. They might still tell you that they are Jewish or Muslim or atheist and don't celebrate Christmas, but it's pretty inconsiderate and will most likely make you look like a jerk in the process.

So I now have to ask everyone that I meet what their pronouns are?

Correct.

Really?

Yeah. It's the only way to ensure that we're building a gender-inclusive world where people are allowed to determine their gender identities for themselves.

Ugh. But what if I don't want to?

It's 2016. You need to know how to use email, and you need to know how to ask people what pronouns they use.

O.K., fine. You win. I'll start asking people about their pronouns and get over my old-school grammar issues.

Great. Glad we could clear that up. Wanna get a cup of coffee?
